


NEWSLETTER

The Bentley Historical Library

Located at the University of Michigan, The Bentley Historical Library houses an extensive research collection of books, maps, architectural drawings and other materials.

The Gunnar Birkerts Fellowship in Architectural History is open to students and scholars working on studies of architectural history in the twentieth century, anchored in the collections of the Bentley Historical Library. Fellowships are awarded twice yearly (March & November) and awards are \$2,000.

The Mark C. Stevens Fellowship and Bordin/Gillette Fellowship are available to those working on doctoral dissertations or conducting post doctoral research in any area requiring significant use of the holdings of the Bentley Historical Library. These fellowships are awarded twice yearly and awards are \$2,000.

THE ANDREW W. MELLON FOUNDATION

SCHOLARSHIP IN THE SERVICE OF SOCIAL JUSTICE



Announcing a new Mellon Foundation opportunity: "Scholarship in the Service of Social Justice." Grants will be made between \$250,000 and \$500,000. This is open to eligible humanities and humanistic social science fields, as outlined by Mellon here.

Because this is a limited submission, several campus areas will be coordinating to assist faculty and groups to prepare their applications. We are encouraging ideas in the three broad categories outlined by the Foundation:

Civic Engagement and Voting Rights Race and Racialization in the United States Social Justice and the Literary Imagination

To be considered for this award, please submit the following to daniel.hadley@admin.utah.edu by **Friday, April 15th:**

A one-page concept note Estimated total budget List of collaborators, if any CV of the principal investigator

The University is allowed to submit three applications, which will be selected by cross-campus leaders with specific expertise in the three categories outlined above. The Foundations Relations Office and the Office of the Vice President for Research will be responsible for requesting, reviewing, and approving recommendations from these leaders. Applicants will then be assisted to submit a competitive concept to the Foundation, which is due May 16th (more details here). The U has had recent success with Mellon grants, including two awards in the last six months. We encourage all eligible researchers and groups with an interest in scholarship for social justice to apply.

FACULTY EARLY CAREER DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM



The Faculty Early Career Development (CAREER) Program is a Foundation-wide activity that offers the National Science Foundation's most prestigious awards in support of early-career faculty who have the potential to serve as academic role models in research and education and to lead advances in the mission of their department or organization. Activities pursued by early-career faculty should build a firm foundation for a lifetime of leadership in integrating education and research. NSF encourages submission of CAREER proposals from early-career faculty at all CAREER-eligible organizations and especially encourages women, members of underrepresented minority groups, and persons with disabilities to apply.

Jean Monnet Fellowship

Founded in 1857, AIA New York is the oldest and largest chapter of the American Institute of Architects. The Chapter's members include over 5,000 practicing architects, allied professionals, students, and public members interested in architecture and design. AIA New York is dedicated to three goals: design excellence, public outreach, and professional development.

Arnold W. Brunner Grant

This grant furthers advanced study in any area of architectural investigation that will effectively contribute to the knowledge, teaching, or practice of the art and science of architecture. The proposed investigation is to result in a final written work, design project, research paper, or other form of presentation.

Award: \$15,000

Eligibility:

Applicants must be US citizens engaged in the profession of architecture or a related field. They must have received their first professional degree at least five years prior to the date of application.

Center for Architecture Grant Information

Stewardson Keefe LeBrun Travel Grant

This grant is awarded to further the personal and professional development of an architect in early or mid career through travel. Travel plans should be focused on a selected topic of interest to the individual rather than as part of a larger humanitarian or institutional endeavor. If appropriate, the winner may be asked to present at the Center for Architecture upon return.

Award: \$25,000

Eligibility:

Applicants must be US citizens with a professional degree in architecture. They must also be practicing architects, either licensed or unlicensed. Academics may apply, but must also be practicing architects.
